

2017 Was Our Busiest Year – it's official!

The generous donors in Slough dug deep this year and ensured that Slough Foodbank clients had sufficient supplies of food throughout the winter period this year. There was little space for our warehouse volunteers to manoeuvre, and here is the proof. In 2017 we had the largest amount of food donated to Slough Foodbank EVER! Our warehouse volunteers were rushed off their feet since harvest collection time in September (7 tonnes), with no real respite till after Christmas.

Including the Tesco Collection which was 2.2 tonnes, our warehouse staff had to deal with a total of 10.3 tonnes of food and other items which arrived at Slough Foodbank's door in December alone. This was more than one fifth of our donations for the year. Many of our warehouse volunteers came in extra hours and at weekends to create order out of chaos whilst still fulfilling regular stock deliveries to our four distribution centres. They are a BRILLIANT team!

Clearly all these donations do not arrive at the warehouse under their own steam. Thank you to all the donors who kindly dropped their collections at the warehouse at a time when the warehouse volunteers were working. And a big thank you to our volunteer drivers who took onboard all the extra collections when the donors were unable to drop them off themselves.

Hansard Report

Slough Foodbank has entered the anals of history when our MP, Tan Dhesi mentioned us in his speech in Parliament. He kindly donated two signed copies of the Hansard Report which records all the speeches. This poem was written by a Foodbank volunteer a number of years ago. We wanted to include it in our newsletter because it captures the sentiment of what we aim to give at Slough Foodbank, and why we volunteer.

Child Poverty

We noticed an increase in the number of families attending Slough Foodbank, and when we checked the vouchers, we discovered that there had been an increase of 16% in the number of children we helped by in 2017 compared to 2016. Slough Borough Council statistics show 21% of Slough children are living in poverty.

According to Child Poverty Action Group, between 1998 and 2012 800,000 children in the UK were lifted out of poverty. This shows that things can be made better if there is a will to do so and it is possible to make a difference. It is important that childhood poverty is addressed now as there are lifelong implications for those who grow up in poverty – poorer academic results and employment prospects, life expectancy and health complications. Have a look at these shocking statistics from the Child Poverty Action Group.



9 CHILDREN IN POVERTY IN A CLASSROOM OF 30

There were 4 million children living in poverty in the UK in 2015-16 with London being the area with the highest rates of child poverty in the country. That's 30 per cent of children, or 9 in a classroom of 30.

Work does not provide a guaranteed route out of poverty in the UK. Two-thirds (67 per cent) of children growing up in poverty live in a family where at least one person works.

Children in large families are at a far greater risk of living in poverty – 36% of children in poverty live in families with three or more children.

Families experience poverty for many reasons, but its fundamental cause is not having enough money to cope with the circumstances in which they are living. A family might move into poverty because of a rise in living costs, a drop in earnings through job loss or benefit changes.

Child poverty imposes costs on broader society – estimated to be at least \pounds 29 billion a year. Governments forgo prospective revenues as well as commit themselves to providing services in the future if they fail to address child poverty in the here and now.
